What Residents Need to Know: Forest Hills Pool Update

The construction of the borough's swimming pool is almost complete. It took longer than anticipated because there were several repairs during the construction that made the opening of the pool this year impossible.

One repair involved the two pipes going from the filter room to the scum gutter system which needed replaced. The other pipe running from the filter room to the drains in the deep-end of the pool needed a pipe liner which was not in the original plan.

Another unanticipated repair was discovered while the construction crew was replacing and removing the concrete slabs around the deck of the pool. The conduit (electric wiring) for the lights around and inside the pool was found to be rusted and corroded and had to be replaced.

Concrete grouting around the scum gutter is now complete, and the liner for the drain pipe has been installed. The only remaining work will be painting the pool which will take place sometime in late spring (weather permitting). The borough is looking forward to the pool opening at its regular schedule (Memorial Weekend) assuming the borough is able to complete the painting on time.

New Pool Costs Taking Effect in 2017

The pool application will appear, as in the past, in the spring 2017 issue of the *Tree City Times* and on the borough's web-site (www.foresthillspa.org). We thank you for your patience during this construction and hope that you appreciate coming back to a new and beautiful swimming pool.

Because of costs necessary to continue to have the pool available to residents, their families and guests, and to off-set repair costs, pool-pass prices must increase. Those prices will be listed in the pool application that will appear in the spring 2017 issue of the *Tree City Times*, and on the borough's web-site: www.foresthillspa.org.

There are additional changes that will take effect in 2017, and those are:

- Borough residents will have the opportunity to sponsor Chalfant and Churchill residents to purchase pool passes for membership— first 25 families who send in their applications (no later than April 1) will be approved for purchase of passes— details and costs will be found on the pool application.
- The discount for the pool and tennis passes has been discontinued— only one price for each of the passes is now available (family, individual, etc.).
- The plus package number of daily admission tickets available to purchase decreased from 10 to 5 tickets. Tickets purchased on or after July 15 will remain the same— 10 tickets @ \$50.
- All weekend daily admission prices have increased by \$1.
- The half-off daily admission (5 to 8 p.m.) has been discontinued.

Since 2005, the cost of operating the pool exceeds what the borough collects in pool pass revenue (for more details, see the budget statistics on the borough's web-site), but it is essential to council and the Recreation Board that the pool stays open as an amenity to the residents, and is as viable as possible. The borough is committed to make sure the pool continues to be available to the residents, their families and friends.

Home Collection Program for Household Generated Special Materials

As part of the residential solid waste and recycling contract with Waste Management, you have a convenient opportunity to dispose of your household generated special materials- safely, easily and responsibly. The At Your Door Special CollectionSM program, a residential service offered by Waste Management, continues to provide year-round collections for you.

How Does It Work?

2. Preparing for collection

The collection kit includes an instruction sheet and other items to help pack and secure your household generated special materials. Please read the instruction sheet included in the kit.

3. Material is collected

On the scheduled date, the service technician will collect materials directly from your home. They will sort and pack the materials for proper transportation, recycling and disposal. Participants will receive a postage-paid survey card to complete and mail back to help track the program.

4. You have more material than will fit into the Kit?

Remember, this service is available year-round. Just schedule another collection! Small quantities may be combined with your neighbors. Managing Household Hazardous Waste: The best method of managing Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) is to prevent its generation in the first place. This involves selecting the least toxic item "to do the job" and buying only the minimum amounts necessary. Buying in large quantities is not a bargain if half of it has to be discarded. In the future, please consider buying environmentally friendly products.

Did You Know? Latex paint is not a hazardous waste. It can often be donated to community groups and other organizations for re-use. Please consider this option before disposal.

Used motor oil is not hazardous, but may pollute our groundwater, waterways and soil if not properly managed. Many automotive station, auto parts and supply stores will accept used motor oil for recycling.

Automotive batteries may be exchanged at the place of purchase. Many battery retailers offer recycling even if you are not purchasing a new battery. In some cases, there may be a charge. Some scrap yards will also purchase lead acid batteries.

Changes to the Borough's Recycling Pick-up Schedule

Effective January 1, 2017, the borough's recycling pick-up schedule will change; this means the pick-up for the recycles will now be **every other week**. The dates for pick-up will be posted on the borough's web-site, and on page 3 of this newsletter. Copies of the calendar will also be available in the borough office.

The borough will also be working on acquiring larger recycling containers but in the meantime, if residents want to use their own containers they are permitted to do so as long as they are marked appropriately (i.e., recycling decals, etc.). 
2017 Recycling-Trash Calendar

History of Rotary International and the Forest Hills Rotary Club by Tom Nunnally

In the late 1890s, a young lawyer named Paul Harris moved to Chicago. He was born in Wisconsin and studied in Vermont and Iowa. Since he was single at the time, he found himself lonely. So in 1905, he reached out to three men that he had met and they formed a group of people of different vocations.

They met once a week at the offices of these men. Since they rotated their meetings, they called their group Rotary. They added a young man named Arch Klumph (who later would form the Rotary Foundation in 1917). Soon, they had gained some notoriety, especially from a project in 1907 to bring public toilets to the streets of Chicago. Visiting businessmen from other cities took note of this and started forming their own rotary clubs in other large cities. San Francisco was second and Pittsburgh, in 1911 was the 20th city. Then, Rotary spread to other countries, Cuba being the first, in 1916. Beginning in 1910, Rotary Clubs started assembling at an annual convention.

Rotary continued to grow to over 35,000 clubs now in 180 countries. These clubs are organized into districts, each with its own District Governor. Club Presidents and District Governors change each year. There are over 2,000,000 members of Rotary, Interact and Rotaract. The last two are Rotary high school clubs and university clubs.

Rotary Zones were first established in 1939 to clarify the procedures for nomination of directors and election of officers of Rotary International. In accordance with the by-laws, zone composition is reviewed at least every eight years to ensure that each zone has approximately the same number of Rotarians. As of July 1, 2009, there are 34 zones, realigned effective as of that date.

Rotary Clubs have four avenues of service, Community Service, International Service, Vocational Service and Club Service. Each member is assigned to these avenues based on their own interests. Projects are generated and managed by these avenues. Fundraising and membership growth would be a part of Club Service.

In 1917, Arch Klumph organized the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International at that year's international convention. The first gift was \$24.50 from the Rotary Club of Kansas City. The 2017 Rotary International Convention is in Atlanta, and it expects 40,000 attendees and will celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the Rotary Foundation.

In 1934, a man named Herbert Taylor was chosen to turn around a business called Club Aluminum and, in doing so, wrote a code of behavior for his company. Since Herb Taylor was a Rotarian, he shared this with his club and it eventually, in 1940, became Rotary's Four Way Test:

Of the things we think, say or do...

1. Is it the truth?
2. Is it fair to all concerned?
3. Will it bring goodwill and better friendships?
4. Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

In 1947, Paul Harris died and the Foundation established an award, called the Paul Harris Fellowship, and anyone donating \$1,000 on their behalf, or for others, would become a Paul Harris Fellow. The Rotary Foundation of Rotary International took off and has since become the second largest Foundation in the world.

That same year, the Rotary Club of Forest Hills was formed as club #5187. It became a part of what is now District 7300. Since then, Forest Hills Rotary has had two District Governors and over 40 Paul Harris Fellows, many being multiples (called PHF+2, PHF+3 etc.).

Besides the Paul Harris Fellow Award, there is a notable award in Rotary, the Service Above Self Award. The latter is given

each year to only 150 Rotarians, worldwide. The award is given not just for service in Rotary, but also for contributions to the community and world through other efforts and organizations. District 7300 has seven of the awardees. Some of these have been District Governors, but some are just ordinary Rotarians. It is special because it does not signify a monetary contribution, but one of personal service to others.

In 1983, Rotary started admitting women as members. This came fairly late, as women in some countries had not received equal status in business or professions. Today, women in Rotary are a very significant and active portion of Rotary members.

That same year, the District Governor for the clubs in the Philippine Islands started vaccinating all of the children against the Polio virus. In 1986, Rotary International adopted this project to eliminate Polio from the face of the earth. That year, there were 350,000 new cases of polio worldwide. In 2016, there are 13 reported cases to this point, all in two countries, Afghanistan and Pakistan. We are so close to ending Polio.

The Rotarian magazine is one of the best organizational periodicals around and highlights, each month, what Rotarians are doing for others all over the world. It also contains articles about inspirational

people and some features on improvement of personal skills.

One of the greatest joys of being a Rotarian is the chance to visit other weekly Rotary club meetings throughout the District and the world. There you meet great people and learn about their local area. These clubs welcome Rotarian visitors like they are old friends.

There are three good reasons for joining and becoming active in Rotary:

1. You can realize your inner desire of helping others who cannot help themselves. Rotary offers you the leverage to make a significant impact in the community and worldwide.
2. You will meet many truly outstanding people in our District and worldwide.
3. You will enjoy fellowship with others outside of your daily contacts and Rotary will become like an extended family. You will enjoy the fun and fellowship that you can hardly find elsewhere.

So, the key to all of this is joining Rotary and becoming active in your club. It will never fail to make you much happier and feeling fulfilled.

By the way, another benefit is when you wear your Rotary Pin. Much of the world may not recognize the significance of it, but other Rotarians and those who know something about Rotary will take notice. They will see you as a caring person of action and a person of high integrity.

The Forest Hills Rotary Purchases Solar Panels for Rwanda Orphanage for Abandoned Children By Bob Dove, PhD, Rotary Club of Forest Hills, District 7300 ADG 2016-2017

The Rotary Club of Forest Hills has purchased solar panels that generate cheap, reliable electrical power for the boys' and girls' dormitories at Urukundo Village for abandoned children that it has supported for the past four years. Excess power generated by the solar panels will also provide power to the administrative offices at the Urukundo Village Home for Abandoned and Abused Children in Muhanga, Rwanda. Previously, the village had to use the expensive electric grid. Batteries will store the electricity generated by the solar panels for evenings and rainy days.

The Rotary Club of Forest Hills has a history with Urukundo (which means "love" in the native language). Situated some 60 miles west of Kigali, the capital of Rwanda, Urukundo Village was started 10 years ago by the now 85-year old Arlene Brown of Williamsport, PA, who sold all of her worldly belongings and moved to Rwanda on a permanent basis after making many visits as a missionary. What started as an orphanage for girls is now a 10-acre working farm with housing for 29 boys and girls, a primary school for 450 students, a dental clinic and sewing center with retail store. (Visit: www.hopemadereal.org).

In May of this year, the Rotary Club of Forest Hills sent 10 laptops to establish a computer lab at Urukundo. The village now offers an internationally recognized computer skills certification program for its staff, teachers, students and local villagers.

The club's first project at Urukundo was a 2012 global grant to provide a clean-water system, including a solar-powered pumping station to pump spring water up to the village. This freed local women and children from the arduous daily task of hauling water to the village from wells. The children now spend this time in school while the women have learned

basic sewing skills at Urukundo and have a new source of income.

Other Urukundo projects funded by Forest Hills Rotary include the purchase of sewing machines for a new sewing center and (with the Northern Allegheny Rotary Club and the Rich-Mar Rotary Club) raised money for two modern dental chairs and related equipment. This dental clinic at Urukundo has become a part of the University of Rwanda Dental College.

The Rotary Club of Forest Hills is currently accepting applications for their new Community Grant Program. Any non-profit, civic, community service or volunteer organization serving the Forest Hills area is invited to apply. The Rotary Club is offering two \$500 grants to any non-profit organization that is dedicated

A Proud Rotary Member and Forest Hills Resident TOM NUNNALLY—1942-2016

At the age of 74, after a brief illness, on Monday, September 26, Tom Nunnally passed away. Beloved husband of 48 years to Carolyn D. Nunnally; loving father of Matthew (Ashley) Nunnally, Annie (Justin) Eason, and Hope (Jarrett) Haynes; dear granddad of Rosalyn and Calloway Nunnally and Joseph Thomas "JT" Eason; brother of Nancy (James) LaFavor.



Tom was born and raised in Athens, GA. He received a BBA from the University of Georgia in 1964 and an MBA from the University of Arizona in 1970. After college, Tom was an officer in the US Navy in the Naval Supply Corps and served during the Vietnam War.

Tom enjoyed a very successful career in the banking industry in Pittsburgh. He built many long lasting relationships while serving as a Senior Loan Executive in area banks. He became CEO of Iron and Glass Bank in the early 1990s. He later became co-founder and SVP of Enterprise Bank where he retired in 2004, but remained on the Board of Directors until his passing.

Above all, Tom was committed to serving God, community, and humanity. He was an active member of All Saints Church in Verona and a trustee of the Anglican Diocese of Pittsburgh.

Since moving to Pittsburgh in 1975, Tom served on Forest Hills Council, volunteered as a Flivver driver and was recognized as Forest Hills Citizen of the Year in 2014. He was perhaps the most proud of his work with Rotary International and the Forest Hills Rotary Club, where he dedicated his efforts to the Hope Made Real and Pure Water for All projects. He was one of 150 Rotarians worldwide to receive the Service Above-Self Award.

He will be remembered for his love of Georgia Bulldogs football, the Masters Golf Tournament, and never ending devotion to his friends, family and countless others.

Eagle projects are not just about the scout who is trying to get to the rank of Eagle, it is about teaching the scout how to lead a team and learn new skills. "The roof was in dire need of being replaced, so Zach and his crew did a fantastic job. If he needs any more future scout projects, I'm sure we can find something for him to do," said Cindy Simm, Recreation Director for the borough.

 **Cold weather have you blue? Consider going green!**
Twenty tips for winter-time energy conservation

Cold weather not only brings ice and snow, it also increases energy usage. The dark days of winter cause people to turn on their lights earlier and leave them on longer. People drive cars more and walk or ride bikes less in colder temperatures.

Cars burn more fuel in winter due to colder air temperatures and longer warm-up times. Regardless of the home heating method used, energy consumption for heat increases. As consumers, it is important for us to take advantage of every energy-saving opportunity. Think green, save money and help to protect the environment. There are ways to act NOW to reduce energy usage:

1. Purchase energy efficient light bulbs. They will last longer, reduce operating costs, save money and still provide light quality comparable to conventional bulbs.
2. Turn off incandescent lights when you leave a room.
3. Use timers for your lights for safety and efficiency when you come home late or take a vacation.
4. Save time and gas—before shopping for special items, call to see if they are available or can be ordered by phone.
5. Reduce air pollution and conserve gas by carpooling when:
 - Shopping for food
 - Running errands with a friend
 - Going to work
 - Taking the kids to school
6. Shop through cost-effective mail-order catalogues, when appropriate.
7. Install a day/night thermostat which lowers temperatures at night or when you are not at home. It will also turn on the heat before you wake up. Note: According to the U.S. Department of Energy, fuel savings range from 9-18% when thermostats are set back 10 degrees for a period of eight hours.

8. Reduce the amount of heat going to rooms that are rarely occupied. (Check with a professional heating expert if you are unsure of how to do this, or if you have a heat pump system).
9. Take time to caulk around drafty windows, especially near the thermostat.
10. Cover outside window air conditioners or remove them all together when possible. If you cannot reach the outside, use heavy duty plastic sheeting to cover the inside of the unit. Caulk or use weather stripping around window frames where air conditioners must remain.
11. Consider winterizing your windows. If you need to replace windows, read the October 1993 Consumer Reports to get more information on the practicality of double-glazed or Heat Mirror windows which use a special coating to retain interior heat. Do a little research and also check with an architect to see which type is best and most economical to install.
12. Purchase rolls of reflective film in different shades of darkness which adhere to windows and save up to forty percent heat loss in the winter. Choices include film with self-adhesive backing that is not reusable after removal or “wetables” in which a spray bottle is used to wet one side of the film before application to windows.
13. Use insulated drapes to improve energy efficiency. These window treatments help to keep the heat in and cold out.
14. Repair or replace old or inefficient storm windows and doors.
15. Add insulation between attic beams, where the insulation is worn or exits in insufficient amounts. Eight inches of fiberglass insulation or about five inches of foamboard are needed to achieve an R-26 rating recommended by the Department of Energy. Before purchasing insulation, check ratings to determine the most cost-effective method for your home. Remember to wear gloves and a mask when installing insulation.
16. Apply weather stripping to attic doors and areas around fold-down attic stairs.
17. Keep your heating units clean and in good operating condition by vacuuming them and periodically having a maintenance check-up.
18. Close flue dampers when not using your fireplace to avoid drafts. Use insulated plywood to close off unused fireplaces and decorate the wood to match your room.
19. Check your car frequently during the winter months for toxic chemical leaks and make repairs as soon as possible.
20. Improve your car's fuel efficiency by having the engine tuned regularly and by changing the oil every three months or 3,000 miles. Monitoring fuel efficiency is easy. Just set your trip odometer to zero before filling the tank. The next time you fill up; divide the number of miles on your trip odometer by the number of gallons you purchased.


SNOW EMERGENCY ROUTES

THE BOROUGH BULLETIN BOARD

CURB THOSE LEAVES

Residents are reminded that raking their leaves into the streets and catch basins or sewer grates may seriously clog and damage the borough's sewer system, resulting in sewage backup into homes and streets. Leaf collection signs are posted in various neighborhoods letting residents know when the Public Works Department will be collecting leaves in the area.

Residents may rake leaves to the curb only during leaf collection—beginning of October through mid-December, weather permitting.

DON'T BLOCK THE SNOW PLOWS

The Public Works Crew asks that residents not park cars in the street or in cul-de-sacs when it snows. Plowing equipment cannot operate safely or efficiently. Another reminder – do not shovel snow from sidewalks or driveways into the street. This is a violation of Pennsylvania Law. Check the borough's web-site for winter weather tips.

TRASH COLLECTION:

When the holiday falls on a weekday, no trash or recycling is collected on these holidays. The trash collection day for those whose scheduled day falls on any of the recognized holidays occurs the day after the holiday. The scheduled collection day for all others that fall after the holiday is then delayed one day. Collection days prior to a holiday in a given week are unaffected.

Please note that only six holidays affect trash collection when they fall on a weekday (New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas Day). See calendar on page 3.

If residents are in need of recycle bins, they are available at the borough office.

Neighbors helping neighbors—REMINDER

With the winter weather upon us, heavy snowfall puts the elderly and those with health conditions physically unable to handle the daunting task of keeping the snow off sidewalks and paths, thus leaving many stranded in their homes. To ease the situation, the borough asked volunteers or others to allow us to place their name on a list so that those in need of help know who they might call. The list is posted at the borough office. It is up to those in need of help to make arrangements with a volunteer or paid snow removal service on that list. The borough only compiled the list as a service and takes no responsibility beyond that, including making arrangements for help, for the quality of work done, etc. Others who may be interested in helping will be added to the list if they contact the borough office at 412-351-7330. Those who think they may need this type of service should review the list in advance of winter weather. Let's all try to be a good neighbor and help when help is needed.

Project Lifesaver

- Do you have a loved one who wanders away from your residence?
- Have you had to call 911 when a loved one cannot be found?
- Do you know a loved one who often "escapes" from home?

If you answer "yes" to one or more of these questions, you may wish to enroll in Project Lifesaver.

What is Project Lifesaver?

Project Lifesaver is a program offered by law enforcement and other emergency responders in 41 states, using proven radio technology and specially trained search and rescue teams, to find citizens enrolled in the program when they become lost.

How Much Does Project Lifesaver Cost?

Allegheny County District Attorney Stephen Zappala is sponsoring Project Lifesaver FREE to Allegheny County residents.

How Does Project Lifesaver Work?

Persons enrolled in the program wear a small transmitter, about the size of a wristwatch, which emits a unique tracking signal. If a person goes missing, search teams use their signal receiving equipment to track and locate the missing person.

Who can Enroll?

Any Allegheny County resident who is a caregiver can enroll on behalf of a person* with Alzheimer's, or other form of dementia, Down's syndrome, autism spectrum disorder or other disability, as well as veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder who have a tendency to wander, run or escape from their residences. All participants must receive uninterrupted supervised care from a caregiver or caregivers, twenty-four hours a day.

*Persons residing in group homes or who operate motor vehicles are NOT permitted to be enrolled.

How Can I Enroll?


